

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
We prefer happy endings, but today we are led from the joy of welcoming Jesus into Jerusalem, up to the crucifixion and burial of Jesus in the tomb.

Not pretty but pretty real.

Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week, the intentional journey we take as a community to enter into not only the passion of Jesus, but to enter into our own stories of passion, betrayal by fickle friends, sorrow, agony and even death — so that we might experience resurrection.

Please do not let the secular world rob you of the graces of this week. In times past the world seemed to slow down and it was easier on a certain level to make this week holy. Now, it clearly has to be a personal commitment that each one of us makes. We have to choose to pause from our normal, busy routine and to give this week to God. We have to choose to pray, to meditate upon what Christ did for us, and to take part in the beautiful liturgies prepared for us.

The moods created are as mixed as our lives. We have some days of glorious happiness, of success and joy and also sad days of contradiction and failure. Let this week speak to you and truly be a 'holy week'.





This week is the holiest week of the Church year because it commemorates the "hour" of Jesus. This is the hour he had been moving toward all his life. It was for this hour he came from the Father. He will become sin for us and nail it to a tree. He returns to the Father and promises,

"I go to prepare a place for you so that where I am you also may be."

Come join with us in liturgical celebration of these great events of Holy Week.

On Holy Thursday we enter into the mystery of being master and servant. To do what Jesus did we need to look at our neighbors and pick up the towel.

With authority grounded in humility, kneel before them and wash off the dirt of daily living. If you are a neighbor in need of washing, lay aside your pride and, like Peter, accept the service of the one kneeling before you—then go, and do likewise. Be blessed as you wash the feet of others and reveal the face of the master through the towel in your hands.

On Good Friday we must see the cross as God's solidarity with men and women in the condition of human suffering—not to eternalize it but to suppress it. The manner in which God seeks to suppress it is not by domination, but by love. Christ lived and preached this new dimension. The cross is the symbol of human power—and the symbol of Jesus' love and fidelity. Love is stronger than death, and power collapses before it. The loyalty of the cross, then, the love on the cross, has triumphed. The name for this is resurrection. Easter is the grand celebration of some really good news. The really good news is that first the women and then Peter came to the tomb of Jesus' burial and did not find Jesus.

Though filled with fear the women then become the confident proclaimers of Jesus' resurrection. Peter is soon filled with "amazement at what has occurred." At the empty tomb amazement is the only reaction but it will be followed by faith, understanding and carrying out the mission. As we renew our baptismal promises we can do no better than to have that followed by faith, understanding and working with the risen Jesus in the work the Father has given us to accomplish.



As we observe the passion and death of Jesus, we must remember that no one ethnic or religious group of people is responsible for the death of our Savior. He died voluntarily for the sins of all people "at the hands of evildoers" so that we might be saved from eternal death. The use of the words "the Jews" (or similar expressions) in the gospel accounts of Christ's death does not mean that the Jewish people killed Jesus. In the Gospel of John, for example, it is not even clear who "the Jews" that seek Jesus' death are. Certainly Jesus, his mother Mary, the apostles, and most, if not all of the disciples, are also "the Jews." In fact, everyone in the gospel account except Pilate, his wife, and his soldiers are Jews. (Simon was probably a Jew from Cyrene, perhaps in Jerusalem for the holy day. And scripture tells us that Joseph of Arimathea was "a disciple of Jesus," but it doesn't necessarily mean that he wasn't Jewish - he owned a grave in Jerusalem.) To think that the gospel means that the Jewish people - then and now - are responsible for the death of Jesus (and thus today are to be coerced to convert, blamed or

condemned) is wrong. It is sinful to twist the sacred scriptures for any purpose of hate, bigotry or prejudice. It is better to recall the words of the prophet Isaiah that we hear on Good Friday: "He was pierced for our offenses, crushed for our sins...the Lord laid


